7: Approval of Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan Revision for 2023-2027

A Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan is required for every transit agency receiving federal assistance while owning, operating, or managing capital assets.

Each agency's TAM Plan outlines the people, tools and processes used to address asset management policy and goals. It helps support planning, budgeting, and communications for internal and external stakeholders. While also providing accountability and visibility for the agency's goals and practices.

The updated plan's targets and proposed investments have been adjusted since the September 2019 plan to account for additional vehicle age, expected service changes and the agency's current work toward meeting state requirements for alternative fuel vehicles within the next few years.

BCAG staff informed the Board that the updated Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan for BCAG/B-Line has been completed. This plan will cover the period of September 20213 through August 2027.

8: 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) Development

BCAG is required to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) by December 15, 2023, for the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

A "call for projects" was issued by BCAG for 2024 RTIP/STIP programming consideration. A funding target of \$8.4 million has been provided from the California Transportation Commission. Staff received eight projects from the various local jurisdictions totaling \$20.4 million in funding requests.

BCAG staff informed the Board of the four requirements for new project programming considerations as defined in the current STIP guidelines. Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy, Project Study Reports, Criteria for Measuring Performance and Cost-Effectiveness, and ePPR.

In addition, BCAG indicated to the jurisdictions that project evaluation will be based on the goals of the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure developed from the Governor's Executive Orders.

The Executive Orders and resulting CAPTI document define a more specific environment for which all transportation funding is programmed through Regional Transportation Agencies and Metropolitan organizations in California. Priority areas for performance measures were discussed.

BCAG staff are currently reviewing each project received. A preliminary programming recommendation will be presented at the October BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) and BCAG Board Meetings.

9: Butte Regional Transit Fourth Quarter 2022/23 Report

BCAG staff presented the Board with key financial and statistical results for Butte Regional Transit (B-Line) for the fourth quarter and full fiscal year of 2022/23.

Lack of riders continues to be an issue in meeting the annual fare box rations previously mandated by the TDA. However, in July 2021, California AB 149 was passed that extended the previous TDA exemption from the farebox requirement through the end of fiscal year 2022/23. With this, the definition of "local funds" was also changed to allow any nonstate funding as part of "farebox" ratio.

Overall, ridership throughout the year has been trending upwards over fiscal year 2021/22. These ridership numbers are trending upwards, with the expected fluctuations from student ridership at various times of the year.

Rural Fixed Route came in at 11.4% of operating costs for the fiscal year. Urban Fixed Route fares came in at 11.8% of operating costs. Rural Paratransit at 7.1% and Urban Paratransit finished the year at 8.1% of operating costs.

BCAG staff informed the Board that there was one preventable accident in the quarter and five valid complaints.

APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT 1 TO THE 2023/24 OVERALL WORK PROGRAM (OWP) & BUDGET AND OVERALL WORK PROGRAM AGREEMENT (OWPA)

PREPARED BY: Julie Quinn, Chief Fiscal Officer

ISSUE: BCAG Chief Fiscal Officer is requesting the BCAG Board of Directors approval of an amendment for the FY23/24 OWP & Budget with an effective date of October 1, 2023.

DISCUSSION: Amendment #1 adjusts the following work elements (WE) to reflect the actual carryover of contract costs and funding from the prior year. The net budget increase to revenue and expense totals \$137,102.

The following changes by work element are:

- <u>WE 24-111 Complete Streets:</u> FHWA Planning (PL) funds of \$4,926 were remaining from the prior year. No local match is required for this work so \$2,280 is being removed. Staff time is increased for the net of \$2,646.
- WE 24-129 SB1 STP 22/23 2024 SCS Development: SB1 22/23 State Transportation Planning (STP) funds of \$26,770 were remaining from the prior year. This and the local match are carried over into the same project scope and consultant work with this added Work Element.
- <u>WE 24-130 North Valley Rail Plan:</u> FTA 5304 grant funding is increased to actual carryover of \$229,486. Local match and consultant work are also adjusted.
- WE 24-130.1 North Valley Rail Plan Support- FHWA Planning (PL) funds are reduced \$39,038 to meet carryover. Local Transportation Planning funds are utilized instead.
- WE 24-301 Transit Planning & Coordination FTA 5303 had a carryover of \$21,558. This is being utilized in place of FHWA Planning (PL). No change to expenditures.

Attached is a summary of adjustments to the FY23/24 OWP & Budget.

NORTH VALLEY PASSENGER RAIL STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

PREPARED BY: Chris Devine, Planning Director

ISSUE: BCAG received \$500,000 in grant funding from Caltrans in 2021 to study expanding passenger rail service northward from the Sacramento area to Butte County and the study is nearing completion.

DISCUSSION: Work is still on track to release a draft strategic plan this December and host a virtual public workshop to review key components of the draft document with interested community members. After completion of a public review period lasting through January 2024, a final plan will be completed in late February. Recent project updates include:

• BCAG staff is working toward the next phase of the project, which includes development of the environmental document and preliminary engineering work (also referred to as PA&ED) with a cost estimate of \$5 million. Staff seeks to program \$2.5 million in the 2024 BCAG Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), which will be brought forth for adoption by the BCAG Board in December 2024. Caltrans District 3 has nominated the remaining \$2.5 million in the Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP). This would provide the funding needed to complete the required environmental document and associated preliminary engineering. A Project Study Report equivalent document has been completed and is being reviewed by Caltrans staff. This is required when programming a new project in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) (the STIP reflects both ITIP and RTIP projects).

If approved by the BCAG Board in December, and the California Transportation Commission (CTC) in March 2024, funds would be available to begin work on this phase in July 2024 (preliminary work could begin in March/April using separate funding sources). BCAG would lead this phase of work with the San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority (SJJPA) serving as CEQA lead and a collaborating project partner. The Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) has also agreed to coordinate with BCAG, Caltrans and SJJPA to contribute funding towards future components of the project.

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- BCAG staff is also recommending that a portion of BCAG's recently approved
 Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) formula funds be programmed
 to advance a portion of the preliminary engineering (design) component of the
 project. This would allow for the environmental phase to achieve 30%
 engineering, rather than just the typical 15%. This approach has been
 recommended to BCAG staff by SJJPA and the consultant team at AECOM, as
 they have found that completing 30% design during the environmental phase can
 significantly accelerate project delivery.
- Going forward, additional BCAG TIRCP formula funds, combined with a possible contribution of the Sacramento Area Council of Governments' (SACOG's) TIRCP formula funds, could allow for the project to be funded through the entire engineering phase (also referred to as PS&E). A separate agenda item is provided at today's meeting regarding BCAG's TIRCP formula allocation and proposed uses of these funds.
- Ridership and revenue data for the proposed North Valley Rail service has been developed by the consultant team at AECOM and is shown below. AECOM staff will present information at the meeting pertaining to the methodology for developing the estimates.

The estimates reflect the likely ridership and revenues for the initial starter service of four daily roundtrips starting in 2030. Because this corridor is envisioned to have hourly service by 2050 and eventual service to Red Bluff and Redding, these numbers are a starting point and are likely to increase over time. They provide a strong indication that the North Valley Rail service will be successful in moving a significant number of passengers annually and will generate more than sufficient revenue based on current operations of the ACE and Amtrak San Joaquins.

DRAFT 2024 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (RTIP) RECOMMENDATIONS

PREPARED BY: Iván Garcia, Programming Director

ISSUE: BCAG is required to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) by December 15, 2023, for the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

DISCUSSION: BCAG requested project nominations from member jurisdictions for consideration of programming in the 2024 RTIP, which has a funding target of \$8.4 million. Staff received 8 project submittals totaling over \$20 million and has reviewed each of the projects. Staff has developed a draft recommendation list for the Boards consideration prior to developing a final 2024 RTIP.

Table 1 identifies staff's project programming recommendations for the 2024 RTIP, which were reviewed with the BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee at their October 5th meeting.

Table 2 identifies the projects not recommended for programing in the 2024 RTIP and identifies a funding program that is better suited for the funding of those projects.

The Draft 2024 RTIP programming recommendations presented by staff meet the requirements identified in the 2024 STIP Guidelines and are in alignment with the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI) adopted by California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) in July 2021.

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While staff's 2024 RTIP recommendations are above the 2024 Fund Estimate provided to Butte County, STIP guidelines allow regions like BCAG to make a programming recommendation up to 200% of its target. BCAG may be consulted by the CTC to make funding adjustments to financially constrain the STIP after all statewide RTIPs and Caltrans' Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP) have been submitted.

For those projects submitted and not recommended for the 2024 RTIP, staff will prepare a future Board agenda item outlining other funding for those projects. Staff is not recommending funding for the SR 99 Southgate Interchange Project at this time due to the financial constraints of the RTP/SCS and the lack of a comprehensive funding plan for the entire project.

REQUESTED ACTION: This item is provided for information and discussion. The 2024 RTIP is scheduled for adoption at the December 7, 2023, BCAG Board of Directors meeting.

2024 UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS PROCESS

PREPARED BY: Victoria Proctor, Associate Planner

ISSUE: As the administrator of Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds for Butte County, BCAG is responsible for performing the annual Unmet Transit Needs (UTN) process. This process requires at least one public hearing for the purpose of soliciting comments on unmet transit needs that may exist within the county.

DISCUSSION: In Butte County, the UTN process entails a comprehensive public outreach program culminating in the public hearing before the BCAG Board of Directors. For thirty days before the public hearing, testimony is solicited regarding perceived unmet transit needs that may be reasonable to meet. The purpose of this process is to ensure that all unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet are met before funds are expended for non-transit uses, such as streets and roads. Staff has made the decision to move up the UTN process this fiscal year to better coincide with the 2024/25 TDA preliminary apportionments.

The testimony gathered is analyzed to determine if there are any transit needs that meet the adopted definitions of "Unmet Transit Need" and "Reasonable to Meet". This analysis report, the Transit Needs Assessment, is reviewed by the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), which provides a recommendation on the findings to the BCAG Board of Directors. If the Board determines there are unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet, those needs must be satisfied before any TDA funds may be expended for non-transit purposes.

The public hearing is set for December 7, 2023, before the BCAG Board of Directors at its normally scheduled time. Please see Attachment 1 for the notice which has been published in the local newspapers, posted on B-Line's website and Facebook page, and posted in each of the B-Line buses in Hmong, Spanish, and English.

APPROVAL OF TRANSIT AND INTERCITY RAIL CAPITAL PROGRAM AND ZERO EMISSION TRANSIT CAPITAL PROGRAM ALLOCATION PLAN

ISSUE: BCAG is submitting an allocation request to the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) for \$23.9 million to partially fund the development of preliminary engineering (design) for the North Valley Rail Project and the zero-emission deployment project.

DISCUSSION: Assembly Bill 102 Senate Bill 125 chaptered on July 7, 2023 expanded the Transit Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) and established the Zero-Emission Transit Capital Program (ZETCP) for the purpose of "modernizing California's intercity, commuter, and urban rail systems, and bus and ferry transit systems, to significantly reduce emissions of greenhouse gases, vehicle miles traveled, and congestion". Both programs are funded by the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF). The GGRF is funded by the Cap-and-Trade Program. Cap and Trade is a market-based system whereby funding is generated through the buying and selling of credits among industries deemed to be emitting environmentally harmful emissions.

BCAG is one of 49 Regional Transportation Planning Agencies in California identified to receive an allocation through the existing mechanism of the Transit Development Act (TDA) over the next two fiscal years totaling \$23,989,331 from these two (2) programs. The North Valley Rail Project and Butte Regional Transit Zero-Emissions Deployment are the two types of projects that fit the intent of the TIRCP and ZETCP.

North Valley Rail The project has established partnerships with the San Joaquin Joint Powers Agency, San Joaquin Joint Rails Commission, Caltrans, Union Pacific and SACOG for the purpose of funding development of the entire project and is establishing relationships and commitments from additional state and federal agencies.

<u>Butte Regional Transit Zero-Emissions Deployment</u> The development of hydrogen powered zero emissions transit buses is an alternative to 100% battery electric buses and may provide a sustainable advantage over battery electric buses. Staff have established connections with suppliers and development of hydrogen fueling solutions as well emerging transit bus manufacturing. The requested funds may also be used for

purchase of zero-emission vehicles, hydrogen mobile refueling station, infrastructure upgrades, and design/permitting to deploy these technologies.

Staff is preparing a TIRCP/ZETCP Allocation Package for the following projects as follows:

Fund	Amount Requested	Project
TIRCP (FY 23/24)	\$10,488,545	North Valley Rail
TIRCP (FY 24/25)	\$4,511,455	North Valley Rail
TIRCP (FY 24/25)	\$6,002,814	Zero Emission Deployment
ZETCP (Years 1-4)	\$2,986,518	Zero Emission Deployment

The total request for the North Valley Rail project is \$15,000,000 in FY 23/24 and 24/25 TIRCP funds. The total request for the Zero-Emission Deployment project is \$8,989,332 in FY 24/25 TIRCP and ZETCP (Years 1-4).

When funds are approved for allocation, they will be deposited with BCAG in a specific fund for the purpose intended and will require a reporting requirement as is the existing practice with funds deposited through the TDA.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: The Executive Director is requesting the BCAG Board of Directors authorize the submission of the TRCP/ZETCP allocation package for the purposes and projects stated.
