ITEMS FOR ACTION

7: Public Hearing and Approval of 2023 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) Amendment #3

BCAG is required to amend the 2023 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). This includes a new air quality emissions analysis and conformity determination which required a public hearing.

The purpose of the amendment is to add new projects and amend an existing project. One new project is capacity increasing and requires a new air quality emissions analysis and conformity determination.

The details regarding this amendment were discussed and include three projects: Town of Paradise-Roe Rd Extension Project, Butte County- Cohasset Road Widening and Fire Safety Project, and Town of Paradise-Go Paradise/Skyway Link Project.

This item was presented to the BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee and circulated to the Interagency Consultation Review group.

On motion by Board Member Ritter and seconded by Board Member Tryon, Public Hearing and Approval to of 2023 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) Amendment #3 was unanimously approved.

8: Public Hearing and Approval of 2020 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) Amendment #1

The 2020 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy is required to be amended to ensure consistency with the short range 2023 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) through Amendment #03.

The purpose of the amendment is to ensure consistency between the long-range plan (RTP/SCS) with the short-range program (FTIP) and to update the Air Quality Emissions Analysis and Conformity Determination.

BCAG staff updated the appropriate appendix tables to ensure projects in the FTIP are in alignment with the RTP/SCS. Since the 2023 FTIP Amendment #03 includes a new non-exempt project, the amendment includes a new air quality emissions analysis and conformity determination.

On motion by Board Member Ritter and seconded by Board Member Kimmelshue, Public Hearing and Approval to of 2020 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) Amendment #1 was unanimously approved.

9: Public Hearing for BCAG's FTA Section 5310 Grant Application to Determine there are Local Non-Profit Agencies Able to Provide ADA Complementary Paratransit Service

A public hearing to determine if there are any non-profit agencies readily available to provide transit service to elderly and disabled was held, as required by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

Upon completing the hearing, BCAG will proceed to solicit federal funding under the 5310 Program.

On motion by Board Member Tryon and seconded by Board Member Ritter, Public Hearing for BCAG'S FTA Section 5310 Grant Application to Determine there are Local Non-Profit Agencies Able to Provide ADA Complementary Paratransit Service was unanimously approved.

10: Sustainable Communities Strategy-Progress Report

Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) is the state designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) and federally designated Metropolitan Transportation Planning (MPO) for the Butte County region.

11: Update on North Valley Passenger Rail Strategic Plan

BCAG received \$500,000 in grant funding from Caltrans to study expanding passenger rail service northward from the Sacramento area to Butte County. This study is continuing to move forward.

BCAG staff is working with its project partners and consultant team at AECOM to continue moving the North Valley Passenger Rail Strategic Plan (NVPRSP) forward.

Staff updated the Board on all recent project updates.

12: 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) Development and Schedule

BCAG staff is required to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) by December 15, 2023, for the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

The 2024 STIP will cover the next five fiscal years beginning July 1, 2024 (FY 24/25-28/29). The State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) is adopted by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and is comprised of two components including the Regional Improvement Program and Interregional Improvement Program.

Every two years, Caltrans prepares a Fund Estimate identifying the amount of funding available to regions for new projects.

APPROVAL OF FISCAL YEAR 2023/24 PRELIMINARY TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ACT (TDA) CLAIMS

PREPARED BY: Julie Quinn, Chief Fiscal Officer

ISSUE: Transportation Development Act (TDA) regulation requires the governing board of the regional transportation agency approve by resolution all claims filed for the allocation of TDA funds.

DISCUSSION: Fiscal Year 2023/24 TDA funds have been apportioned to each jurisdiction with the Findings of Apportionment approved by the BCAG Board on May 25, 2023. A jurisdiction may file an expenditure plan to claim their apportionment for projects in the fiscal year. The FY 2023/24 claims may include unclaimed prior year apportionments. The expenditure plan allocates the apportionments to the prescribed uses within the TDA regulations. It may also include allocations of previously distributed, but unspent TDA funds that are locally held fund balance. If no projects are identified for the current apportionment, the funds are considered unallocated apportionment and are held by BCAG in the jurisdiction's name for use in future projects.

Use of the funds is prioritized by the TDA regulations. STA provides funding solely for public transportation services while LTF allocation priorities are as follows:

- 1. TDA Administration
- 2. Transportation Planning and Programming
- 3. Pedestrian and Bicycle projects
- 4. Rail passenger and Transit services
- 5. Other transportation purposes including streets and roads. These claims may only be apportioned when all other uses for the funds have been exhausted.

The Preliminary Expenditure Plan identifies the jurisdictions use of funds in accordance with the requirements of the TDA. Butte Regional Transit (BRT) may claim operating and capital funds directly. The Cities and Town may claim funds for other transit needs, as well as bike and pedestrian, and streets and roads projects. In the current year, the City of Biggs, Oroville and Gridley have not submitted a preliminary claim but may do so at a later date.

Staff has reviewed the attached claims and found them to be in compliance with the TDA guidelines and within the apportionments approved by this Board. The attached resolution identifies the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and State Transit Assistance (STA) that has been claimed by the jurisdictions and allows for flexibility should minor adjustments to the form be necessary. Approval of the resolution initiates the distribution of current apportionments to the claimants.

The Final Expenditure Plans will be brought to the Board for approval later in the fiscal year after the FY22/23 TDA audits are complete.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff requests the BCAG Board adopt Resolution No. 2023/24-06 to approve the preliminary TDA Claims for LTF and STA as summarized below:

BUTTE COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS RESOLUTION NO 2023/24-06

RESOLUTION OF THE PRELIMINARY ALLOCATION OF TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ACT (TDA) FUNDS TO THE BUTTE COUNTY JURISDICTIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023/24

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments has been designated by the Secretary of the State of California, Business and Transportation Agency, as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for Butte County, pursuant to the provisions of the Transportation Development Act of 1971, as amended; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Butte County Association of Governments, under the provision of the Transportation Development Act, to review transportation claims and make allocations of funds from the Local Transportation Fund and the State Transit Assistance fund based on the claims; and

WHEREAS, the Auditor of Butte County is required to pay monies in the fund to the claimants pursuant to allocation instructions received by him/her from the Butte County Association of Governments; and

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments has reviewed this claim for Transportation Development Act funds and has made the following findings and allocations:

- 1. The claimants proposed expenditures are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan.
- 2. The level of passenger fares and charges is sufficient to enable the operator or transit service claimant to meet the fare revenue requirements of Public Utilities Code Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.5, and 99268.9, as they may be applicable to the claimant.
- 3. The claimant is making full use of federal funds available under the Federal Transit Act, as amended.
- 4. The claimant has prepared and submitted the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and State Transit Assistance (STA) Fund Annual Project and Expenditure Plan.
- 5. The sum of the claimant's allocation from the State Transit Assistance Fund and the Local Transportation Fund does not exceed the amount the claimant is eligible to receive during the fiscal year.
- 6. Priority consideration has been given to claims to offset reductions in federal operating assistance and the unanticipated increase in the cost of fuel, to enhance existing public transportation services, and to meet high priority regional, countywide, or area wide public transportation needs.
- 7. The regional entity may allocate funds to an operator for the purposes specified in Section 6730 of the California Code of Regulations only if, in the resolution allocating the funds, it also finds the following:

- a) The operator has made a reasonable effort to implement the productivity improvements recommended pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 99244. This finding shall make specific reference to the improvements recommended and to the efforts made by the operator to implement them.
- b) For an allocation made to an operator for its operating costs, that the operator is not precluded by any contract entered into on or after June 28, 1979, from employment of part time drivers or from contracting with common carriers of persons operating under a franchise or license.
- c) A certification by the Department of the California Highway Patrol verifying that the operator is in compliance with Section 1808.1 of the Vehicle Code, as required in Public Utilities Code Section 99251. The certification shall have been completed within the last 13 months, prior to filing claims.
- d) The operator is in compliance with the eligibility requirements of Public Utilities Code Section 99314.6.

ISSUE: The project list for the FY 2023/24 State of Good Repair allocation is submitted for approval.

DISCUSSION: As the Regional Transportation Planning Agency, BCAG has been given the responsibility to compile, approve and submit to the Department of Transportation, an annual list of eligible projects from transit operators in the region to be funded with State of Good Repair annual allocations. As specified in SB1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, effective January 1, 2018, the State of California imposes a transportation improvement fee, which is a supplemental charge on the registration of vehicles. A portion of the revenues generated from this fee establishes the SGR Program. SGR funds are made available for eligible capital projects that maintain the public transit system in a state of good repair.

Estimates of annual funding are provided by the State Controller's Office. Allocations are based on population and farebox revenues. For FY 2023/24 the estimated allocation is \$349,520. Butte Regional Transit has submitted its proposed project for maintaining existing administrative and maintenance facilities.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff requests the BCAG Board approve the FY 2023/24 SGR by Resolution 2023/24-05.

WHEREAS, in order to qualify for these funds, the <u>Butte County Association of Governments</u> is required to submit a proposed project list to California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) on an annual basis; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the <u>Butte County Association of Governments</u> hereby approves the SB1 State of Good Repair Project List for FY 2023-24; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the <u>Butte County Association of Governments</u> that the fund recipient agrees to comply with all conditions and requirements set forth in the Certification and Assurances document and applicable statutes, regulations and guidelines for all SGR funded transit capital projects.

2024 SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY - UPDATE

PREPARED BY: Chris Devine, Planning Director

ISSUE: Senate Bill 375 requires BCAG to prepare a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) update every four years (as part of the Regional Transportation Plan update cycle). The SCS is designed to support the integration of land use, housing, and transportation for the purpose of reducing GHG emissions from passenger vehicles to meet regional emission reduction targets assigned to BCAG for the Butte County region. This includes the goal of a 7% reduction in GHG emission by the year 2035 as required by the California Air Resources Board.

DISCUSSION: The next update of the RTP/SCS is scheduled for adoption by the BCAG Board of Directors in December 2024. Development of the 2024 SCS is well underway and on track for approval at the end of next year.

Work Completed to Date

The process for updating the SCS takes approximately two and a half years to complete and has many facets including planning work and coordination, land use and transportation modeling, public outreach events, etc. A summary of some of the work completed to date for the 2024 update includes:

- Updated traffic counts used to calibrate the regional travel demand model (fall 2021-fall 2022). The travel demand model is used in part to determine if the SCS achieves CARB's GHG reduction target.
- Updated land use allocation model (summer 2021-summer 2022).
- Development of Regional Travel Survey (November 2022-February 2023).
 - Designed to receive early input on travel trends and community concerns and preferences regarding travel by vehicle, transit, and active transportation modes.
 - Identified current vehicle and bicycle travel patterns using anonymized cellular location data for analysis of large-scale travel patterns in the

region.

- Results of the survey were shared with the BCAG Board at the April 2023 Board of Directors meeting.
- Development of Regional Growth Forecasts (summer/fall 2022).
- Gathering and developing required data (fall/winter 2022/23).
 - Includes various datasets needed for SCS analysis such as existing and projected regional housing and jobs supply, vehicle miles traveled and GHG emissions, socio-economic data, environmental and agricultural resources, etc.
- Early public outreach activities including updating project website and attendance at community events to distribute SCS update information encouraging public participation (fall 2021-summer 2023). Some of the community events have included the

Current Work

Work continues on the development of the SCS update. This work includes:

- Development of required strategies and scenarios for land use, housing, and transportation to achieve GHG reduction targets.
 - BCAG staff is working with the consultant teams at PlaceWorks and Fehr and Peers to develop four distinct scenarios for the SCS that achieve the GHG reduction targets identified by CARB for the BCAG region.
- Public outreach on scenario development.
 - An online survey is being developed to receive input on the development of the four scenarios. This is expected to go live in early September and be completed in early October.
 - Promotion for the online survey will include email distribution to BCAG and member jurisdiction email distribution lists. These lists include key stakeholders and community-based groups from throughout the region.
 Promotion will also include press releases, advertisements on the B-Line bus fleet, and social media posts.
 - Survey and promotional materials will be translated in Spanish and Hmong.
 - A virtual public workshop is also planned for early October to solicit further input on scenario development.
- Because this information is in the early stages of development, BCAG staff will
 provide more detailed information on scenario development at the next BCAG
 Board meeting.

Next Steps

The next steps in the development of the 2024 SCS include:

 Continued coordination in development of the four scenarios with BCAG member jurisdictions through the Planning Directors Group and Transportation Advisory

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Committee.

- Completion of the online survey and virtual public workshop.
- Continued public outreach and attendance at community events.
- Recommendation by BCAG Staff to the BCAG Board of a preferred scenario in late 2023/early 2024.
- Development of actions and policies that support implementation of the preferred scenario in early/mid 2024.
- Completion of draft RTP/SCS document and associated public workshops in fall 2024.
- Final RTP/SCS document approval by BCAG Board of Directors in December 2024.

A project schedule has been included in **Attachment 1**.
