5: Provisional Long-Term Regional Growth Forecasts 2018-2040

Staff presented the Board with information pertaining to the need to update long-term growth forecasts for housing, population, and employment within Butte County. A draft of the forecasts was made digitally available to the Board and the public. Because of the Camp Fire, these forecasts are provisional and will be updated as more information becomes available.

There was general discussion between the Board and Staff regarding these forecasts and how they will be used.

6: BCAG Strategic Partnerships Transit Grant Application

Staff informed the Board that BCAG has submitted an application for the FY 2020-21 California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) Strategic Partnerships Transit Grant application for the Chico to Sacramento Inter-City Transit Strategic Plan. If successful, this would help identify solutions to consolidate the Butte Regional Transit and San Joaquin Joint Powers Authority's bus and rail services from Butte County to Sacramento County.

There was general discussion between Staff and the Board regarding logistics of this plan being put in place, the potential for farebox recovery on the service, and other sources of funding for the day-to-day activities of the line. Board asked Staff if there were numbers on ridership for the current San Joaquin route, as well as projected ridership for the proposed route.

There is a feasibility study already planned to look into ridership and logistics of merging these two services. This item was presented for information purposes only.

7: Update on BCAG Post Camp Fire Regional Population & Transportation Study

Staff presented the Board with an update on the Post Camp Fire Regional Population & Transportation Study. Staff formed the Project Development Team from the Technical Advisory Committee and the Planning Directors Group to ensure valuable feedback, ideas and concerns are shared as the plan is developed.

The Board had questions concerning the methodology being used to track population in Paradise. Staff informed them that the consultant will be using multiple methods including the Department of Finance information, cell phone usage, and census numbers. The Board suggested that Staff also look at who is using garbage pick-up services on the Ridge, and who is getting mail delivered there.

There was general discussion about how the numbers and information will be used, and what other agencies will have access to this study. This was presented for information purposes only.

8: Governor Newsom Signs Executive Order N-19-19 Aligning Transportation Funding with Climate Goals

Staff informed the Board that Governor Newsom signed Executive Order N-19-19 on September 20, 2019 which immediately redirects California's transportation funding to projects and programs that are intended to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and mitigate the impacts of climate change.

There was discussion between Staff and the Board regarding what impacts this will have on Butte County and if any distinction has yet been made between rural and urban environments in California. Staff has already received the funding to complete the Butte County portions of the SR 70 widening, and is already in the process of purchasing electric buses; it is the future projects that are not currently funded that will need to be re-assessed at a later date.

ISSUE: BCAG applied for the FY 2019/2020 Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program. BCAG requested \$921,385 in FTA Section 5339 funds to replace two Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) buses with two clean diesel buses.

DISCUSSION: The FTA Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program was created by Congress to provide capital funding to replace, rehabilitate and purchase buses, vans, and related equipment, and to construct bus-related facilities. The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) Division of Rail and Mass Transit (DRMT) has been delegated the designated recipient responsibilities by the Governor and is the direct recipient for these funds. DRMT administers the 5339 Program to eligible sub-recipients including public agencies and private non-profit organizations. Approximately \$7 million is available for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2019.

Staff has utilized prior Section 5339 grants for capital improvements to the Butte Regional Operations Center. The CNG buses proposed to be replaced have exceeded their useful life will If awarded, this will apply to Butte Regional Transit's Operating Budget for FY 2019/2020.

If funded, this project will be included in the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) for Butte County. The 5339 application requires a Board Resolution be included.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff is recommending the BCAG Board of Directors approve Resolution No. 2019/2020–07, authorizing the federal funding under FTA Section 5339 (49 U.S.C. Section 5339) with California Department of Transportation.

APPROVAL OF 2019 FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (FTIP) AMENDMENT #3

PREPARED BY: Ivan Garcia, Transportation Programming Specialist

ISSUE: All transportation projects which receive federal transportation funding or require some type of approval by the Federal Highway Administration or Federal Transit Administration are required to be specifically identified in the Federal Transportation Improvement Program. Staff has identified various local projects below which require a formal FTIP amendment be approved by the BCAG Board.

DISCUSSION: The 2019 FTIP Amendment #03 has been prepared and has been available for public review. The purpose of this amendment is to make the following changes described below for various local projects:

NEW FTIP PROJECT:

1. SR 99 Southgate Interchange Feasibility Study. The purpose of this amendment is to add this project for completing a technical study as part of the Preliminary Engineering component utilizing local funds. The project is located at the State Route 99 and Southgate Intersection in the City of Chico. This project is to develop planning and technical studies only for consideration of a future interchange with local connections. This project is included in the current 2016 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Other" indicating that specific activities which do not involve or lead directly to construction, such as planning and technical studies are exempt. The City of Chico is programming \$1,910,000 in FY 18/19 and \$250,000 in FY 20/21 as part of the Preliminary Engineering component.

EXISTING FTIP PROJECTS:

2. SR 99 Corridor Bikeway Phase 5 - 20th Street Crossing. This amendment adds funding as approved by the California Transportation Commission as part of the Active Transportation Program, Cycle 4 grant awards. This amendment updates the programmed funds and project delivery schedule to fund the Right of Way and Construction components. The project funding changed from \$3.2 million to \$15.4

million. This is an existing project in the 2016 RTP/SCS and 2019 FTIP. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Air Quality" indicating that bicycle and pedestrian facilities are exempt.

3. SHOPP Minor Grouped Listing. This amendment adds a new project to the existing Grouped Listing to include a project on State Route 162 in Oroville at 5th Avenue. The scope of the project is upgrade the traffic signal/install interconnect system. This amendment adds \$2,364,200 in the 2019/20 Fiscal year. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that traffic control devices and operating assistance other than signalization projects are exempt.

<u>4. Grouped Projects for Safety Improvements – Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP).</u>

This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HSIP Grouped listing for a project substitution for HSIP7-03-001, on Walnut Street between West 1st and West 9th Streets. This same HSIP7-03-001 has a new scope of, "Various locations throughout City of Chico Limits". The scope of the project is citywide systemic safety improvements including installation of improved signal hardware at signalized intersections, pedestrian crossings at uncontrolled locations and upgraded intersection pavement markings at non-signalized intersection. There is no change in funding or schedule associated with this amendment. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that Highway Safety Improvement Program implementation projects are exempt.

<u>5. Grouped Projects for Bridge Rehabilitation and Reconstruction – Highway Bridge Program (HBP).</u>

This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HBP Grouped listing dated November 4, 2019. This amendment does not add projects, rather updates the revenues for the program. This amendment updates /advances HBP-ID 3470 - Bridge No. 12C0052, Midway Rd over Butte Creek funding as approved by Caltrans HQ High Cost Letter Agreement with Butte County Public Works. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that widening narrow pavements or reconstructing bridges (no additional travel lanes) projects are exempt.

<u>6. Grouped Projects for Safety Improvements – SHOPP Collision Reduction</u>
<u>Program.</u> This amendment adds a new project to the Grouped Listing for State Route 32 post miles 0.3/5.0, Near Chico from Gianella Rd to Muir Ave. The scope of the project is to install lighting, widen shoulders, upgrade end treatments at bridge approaches, and rehabilitate culverts. This amendment adds \$21,850,000 for the

project. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that pavement resurfacing and or rehabilitation projects are exempt.

- 7. Central House Rd Over Wymann Ravine Bridge. This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$65,000 in right-of-way to the FY 19/20 for the same funding. In addition, FY 22/23 construction funds of \$3,325,000 is advanced one fiscal year 21/22. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.
- **8. Guynn Rd over Lindo Channel Bridge Project.** This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$150,000 in right-of-way to the FY 21/20 for the same funding. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.

Since the 2019 FTIP Amendment #03 and 2016 RTP Amendment #07 does not include any new non-exempt projects, per 40 CFR 93.126, the amendments are exempt from the requirement that a new conformity determination and regional emission analysis be performed.

For the purpose of the proposed amendments, BCAG states for the record:

- 1. <u>Exempt Project</u>: No new conformity determination or regional emissions analysis is necessary for this proposed formal amendment. The projects being added as a result of the amendment are exempt from regional emissions analysis per EPA's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.127 Table 3 as referenced above.
- 2. <u>TCM Implementation</u>: There are no Transportation Control Measures in the approved Carbon Monoxide (CO) SIP and there is no approved Ozone or PM2.5 SIP applicable to Butte County. Because there are no TCMs in an approved SIP for Butte County, Butte County currently has no TCMs in place and therefore timely TCM implementation requirements do not apply.

- 3. <u>Financial Constraint</u>: The 2019 FTIP and 2016 RTP have been financially constrained in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR 93.108 and consistent with the U.S. DOT metropolitan planning regulations (23 CFR Part 450).
- 4. Interagency and Public Consultation: For the 2019 FTIP Amendment #03 and 2016 RTP Amendment #07, BCAG initially consulted on this amendment with its Interagency Consultation Review (ICR) group on November 13, 2019. BCAG staff provided a 15-day public review and comment period in compliance with BCAG's adopted Public Participation Plan (PPP). On November 14, 2019, legal notices were posted on the BCAG website. The proposed amendment has been circulated among staff from Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Federal Transit Agency (FTA), and Caltrans. Appendices contain copies of public notices and responses to public comments.

Details of this amendment has been attached to this memo and are posted online at BCAG's website at: http://www.bcag.org/Planning/RTP--SCS/index.html for the RTP/SCS. The RTP/SCS will be amended to reflect updated project costs.

The amended projects, as listed above, exist in the current 2016 Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). The amendment for each project does not reflect a change in the design concept and scope of the project or the conformity analysis years as assumed for the regional emissions analysis of the currently conforming RTP and FTIP. The previous emissions analysis is consistent with the requirements of 40 CFR 93.118 and 93.119, as applicable. This amendment, meets all applicable transportation planning requirements per 23 CFR Part 450 (financial constraint, public involvement and consistency with the RTP). Allocating funds to these projects will not delay the implementation of projects in the 2016 RTP/SCS which are necessary to achieve the highway and transportation system envisioned by the plan. BCAG does not have any Transportation Control Measures in the State Implementation Plan (SIP) and therefore the project does not interfere with any TCMs.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: If no significant comments are received, staff is recommending the Board of Directors approve Amendment #03 by Resolution #2019/2020-09. This resolution also authorizes staff to make any necessary technical corrections to ensure timely state and federal approval.

APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT #03 TO THE 2019 FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR VARIOUS PROJECTS IN BUTTE COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments is the designated Metropolitan Planning Organization for Butte County in accordance with 23 USC 134(b)(6); and Section 450.306 of the Metropolitan and Statewide Planning Rule;

WHEREAS, the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) requires the Butte County Association of Governments, as the Metropolitan Planning Organization, to prepare a Transportation Improvement Program in cooperation with the State and transit operators, to include all projects to be funded under Title 23 and the Federal Transit Administration grants; and requires BCAG to prepare a long-range Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS) and short-range Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP);

WHEREAS, the Butte County Association of Governments has prepared Amendment #03 to the 2019 FTIP as attached to this resolution;

WHEREAS, the 2019 FTIP through Amendment #03 is financially constrained by year and includes a financial plan that demonstrates projects can be implemented using committed funds;

WHEREAS, This amendment does not reflect a change in the design concept and scope of the project or the conformity analysis years as assumed for the regional emissions analysis of the currently conforming RTP and TIP. This amendment, meets all applicable transportation planning requirements per 23 CFR Part 450 (financial constraint, public involvement and consistency with the RTP).

WHEREAS BCAG does not have any Transportation Control Measures in the State Implementation Plan (SIP), therefore the projects do not interfere with any TCMs;

WHEREAS BCAG posted a notice to provide the public with the opportunity to review and comment in accordance with BCAG's adopted Public Participation Plan.

WHEREAS, Amendment #03 as described below is within BCAG's programming targets and is financially constrained for the following activities including:

EXISTING FTIP PROJECTS:

- 2. SR 99 Corridor Bikeway Phase 5 20th Street Crossing. This amendment adds funding as approved by the California Transportation Commission as part of the Active Transportation Program, Cycle 4 grant awards. This amendment updates the programmed funds and project delivery schedule to fund the Right of Way and Construction components. The project funding changed from \$3.2 million to \$15.4 million. This is an existing project in the 2016 RTP/SCS and 2019 FTIP. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Air Quality" indicating that bicycle and pedestrian facilities are exempt.
- 3. SHOPP Minor Grouped Listing. This amendment adds a new project to the existing Grouped Listing to include a project on State Route 162 in Oroville at 5th Avenue. The scope of the project is upgrade the traffic signal/install interconnect system. This amendment adds \$2,364,200 in the 2019/20 Fiscal year. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that traffic control devices and operating assistance other than signalization projects are exempt.

<u>4. Grouped Projects for Safety Improvements – Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP).</u>

This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HSIP Grouped listing for a project substitution for HSIP7-03-001, on Walnut Street between West 1st and West 9th Streets. This same HSIP7-03-001 has a new scope of, "Various locations throughout City of Chico Limits". The scope of the project is citywide systemic safety improvements including installation of improved signal hardware at signalized intersections, pedestrian crossings at uncontrolled locations and upgraded intersection pavement markings at non-signalized intersection. There is no change in funding or schedule associated with this amendment. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that Highway Safety Improvement Program implementation projects are exempt.

5. Grouped Projects for Bridge Rehabilitation and Reconstruction – Highway Bridge Program (HBP).

This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HBP Grouped listing dated November 4, 2019. This amendment does not add projects, rather updates the revenues for the program. This amendment updates /advances HBP-ID 3470 - Bridge No. 12C0052, Midway Rd over Butte Creek funding as approved by Caltrans HQ High

Cost Letter Agreement with Butte County Public Works. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that widening narrow pavements or reconstructing bridges (no additional travel lanes) projects are exempt.

- 6. Grouped Projects for Safety Improvements SHOPP Collision Reduction Program. This amendment adds a new project to the Grouped Listing for State Route 32 post miles 0.3/5.0, Near Chico from Gianella Rd to Muir Ave. The scope of the project is to install lighting, widen shoulders, upgrade end treatments at bridge approaches, and rehabilitate culverts. This amendment adds \$21,850,000 for the project. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that pavement resurfacing and or rehabilitation projects are exempt.
- 7. Central House Rd Over Wymann Ravine Bridge. This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$65,000 in right-of-way to the FY 19/20 for the same funding. In addition, FY 22/23 construction funds of \$3,325,000 is advanced one fiscal year 21/22. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.
- 8. Guynn Rd over Lindo Channel Bridge Project. This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$150,000 in right-of-way to the FY 21/20 for the same funding. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.

WHEREAS, the amended projects, as listed above, exist in the current 2016 Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). The amendment for each project does not reflect a change in the design concept and scope of the project or the conformity analysis years as assumed for the regional emissions analysis of the currently conforming RTP and FTIP. The previous emissions analysis is consistent with the requirements of 40 CFR 93.118 and 93.119, as applicable. This amendment, meets all applicable transportation planning requirements per 23 CFR Part 450 (financial constraint, public involvement and consistency with the RTP). Allocating funds to these projects will not delay the implementation of projects in the 2016 RTP/SCS which are necessary to achieve the highway and transportation system envisioned by the plan. BCAG does not have any Transportation Control Measures in the State Implementation Plan (SIP) and therefore the project does not interfere with any TCMs.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Butte County Association of Governments has prepared and approved Amendment #03 to the 2019 Federal Transportation Improvement Program in accordance with the Transportation Conformity Rule requirements applicable to Butte County and determined that the programming is consistent with the policies, goals and objectives of the adopted 2016 Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy. Based on this analysis, the Butte County 2016 RTP/SCS and the Butte County 2019 FTIP conforms to the applicable State Implementation Plan (SIP) and all applicable sections of the EPA's Transportation Conformity Rule;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the interest of project delivery, the Butte County Association of Governments authorizes its staff to modify the programming information including minor adjustments in cooperation with Caltrans and or FHWA as needed to ensure the timely submittal and approval of the amendment.

APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT #7 TO THE 2016 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN (RTP)/SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY (SCS) FOR CONSISTENCY WITH THE 2019 FTIP

PREPARED BY: Ivan Garcia, Transportation Programming Specialist

ISSUE: The 2016 RTP/SCS is required to be amended to ensure consistency with the short range 2019 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP).

DISCUSSION: The purpose of this amendment is to ensure consistency between the long-range plan (RTP/SCS) with the short-range program (FTIP) adopted by the BCAG Board in December 2019. This amendment updates Table 6-8 in the RTP/SCS to facilitate the project delivery process for the implementing agencies by being able to reference the project in both documents. Having a direct RTP/SCS reference from the FTIP is necessary. This amendment also updates the Air Quality Conformity Analysis and Determination as approved in the 2019 FTIP by the BCAG Board.

Details of this amendment have also been posted online at BCAG's website at: http://www.bcag.org/Planning/FTIP/index.html for the FTIP and at: http://www.bcag.org/Planning/RTP--SCS/index.html for the RTP/SCS.

The 2016 RTP Amendment #07 has been prepared and has been available for public review. This amendment makes the following changes described below for various local projects:

EXISTING RTP/SCS PROJECTS:

1. SR 99 Southgate Interchange Feasibility Study. The purpose of this amendment is to add this project for completing a technical study as part of the Preliminary Engineering component utilizing local funds. The project is located at the State Route 99 and Southgate Intersection in the City of Chico. This project is to develop planning and technical studies only for consideration of a future interchange with local connections. This project is included in the current 2016 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Other" indicating that specific activities which do not involve or lead

directly to construction, such as planning and technical studies are exempt. The City of Chico is programming \$1,910,000 in FY 18/19 and \$250,000 in FY 20/21 as part of the Preliminary Engineering component.

- 2. SR 99 Corridor Bikeway Phase 5 20th Street Crossing. This amendment adds funding as approved by the California Transportation Commission as part of the Active Transportation Program, Cycle 4 grant awards. This amendment updates the programmed funds and project delivery schedule to fund the Right of Way and Construction components. The project funding changed from \$3.2 million to \$15.4 million. This is an existing project in the 2016 RTP/SCS and 2019 FTIP. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Air Quality" indicating that bicycle and pedestrian facilities are exempt.
- 3. SHOPP Minor Grouped Listing. This amendment adds a new project to the existing Grouped Listing to include a project on State Route 162 in Oroville at 5th Avenue. The scope of the project is upgrade the traffic signal/install interconnect system. This amendment adds \$2,364,200 in the 2019/20 Fiscal year. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that traffic control devices and operating assistance other than signalization projects are exempt.
- 4. Grouped Projects for Safety Improvements Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HSIP Grouped listing for a project substitution for HSIP7-03-001, on Walnut Street between West 1st and West 9th Streets. This same HSIP7-03-001 has a new scope of, "Various locations throughout City of Chico Limits". The scope of the project is citywide systemic safety improvements including installation of improved signal hardware at signalized intersections, pedestrian crossings at uncontrolled locations and upgraded intersection pavement markings at non-signalized intersection. There is no change in funding or schedule associated with this amendment. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that Highway Safety Improvement Program implementation projects are exempt.
- <u>Bridge Program (HBP).</u> This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to Caltrans' HBP Grouped listing dated November 4, 2019. This amendment does not add projects, rather updates the revenues for the program. This amendment updates /advances HBP-ID 3470 Bridge No. 12C0052, Midway Rd over Butte Creek funding as approved by Caltrans HQ High Cost Letter Agreement with Butte County Public Works. The project is exempt from regional emissions

analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that widening narrow pavements or reconstructing bridges (no additional travel lanes) projects are exempt.

<u>Program.</u> This amendment adds a new project to the Grouped Listing for State Route 32 post miles 0.3/5.0, Near Chico from Gianella Rd to Muir Ave. The scope of the project is to install lighting, widen shoulders, upgrade end

treatments at bridge approaches, and rehabilitate culverts. This amendment adds \$21,850,000 for the project. The project is exempt from regional emissions analysis per the Environmental Protection Agency's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.126 Exempt Projects, Table 2 "Safety" indicating that pavement resurfacing and or rehabilitation projects are exempt.

- 7. Central House Rd Over Wymann Ravine Bridge. This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$65,000 in right-of-way to the FY 19/20 for the same funding. In addition, FY 22/23 construction funds of \$3,325,000 is advanced one fiscal year 21/22. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.
- 8. Guynn Rd over Lindo Channel Bridge Project. This amendment updates the Butte County FTIP to the Caltrans' HBP individually listed project data dated November 10, 2019. This amendment advances HBP program funds identified in FY 21/22 for \$150,000 in right-of-way to the FY 21/20 for the same funding. The total cost of the project does not change. The scope of the project is to replace the existing 1 lane structurally deficient bridge with a new lane bridge. This is an existing project that is already included in the regional emissions analysis for air quality conformity and does not require a new conformity determination.

Since the 2019 FTIP Amendment #03 and 2016 RTP Amendment #07 do not include any new non-exempt projects, per 40 CFR 93.126, the amendments are exempt from the requirement that a new conformity determination and regional emission analysis be performed.

For the purpose of the proposed amendments, BCAG states for the record:

1. <u>Exempt Project</u>: No new conformity determination or regional emissions analysis is necessary for this proposed formal amendment. The projects being added as a result of the amendment are exempt from regional emissions

analysis per EPA's Transportation Conformity Rule Section 93.127 Table 3 as referenced above.

- 2. <u>TCM Implementation</u>: There are no Transportation Control Measures in the approved Carbon Monoxide (CO) SIP and there is no approved Ozone or PM2.5 SIP applicable to Butte County. Because there are no TCMs in an approved SIP for Butte County, Butte County currently has no TCMs in place and therefore timely TCM implementation requirements do not apply.
- 3. <u>Financial Constraint</u>: The 2019 FTIP and 2016 RTP have been financially constrained in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR 93.108 and consistent with the U.S. DOT metropolitan planning regulations (23 CFR Part 450).
- 4. <u>Interagency and Public Consultation</u>: For the 2019 FTIP Amendment #03 and 2016 RTP Amendment #07, BCAG initially consulted on this amendment with its Interagency Consultation Review (ICR) group on November 13, 2019. BCAG staff provided a 15-day public review and comment period in compliance with BCAG's adopted Public Participation Plan (PPP). On November 14, 2019, legal notices were posted on the BCAG website. The proposed amendment has been circulated among staff from Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Federal Transit Agency (FTA), and Caltrans. Appendices contain copies of public notices and responses to public comments.

Details of this amendment has been attached to this memo and are posted online at BCAG's website at: http://www.bcag.org/Planning/RTP--SCS/index.html for the RTP/SCS. The RTP/SCS will be amended to reflect updated project costs.

The amended projects, as listed above, exist in the current 2016 Regional Transportation Plan / Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP/SCS). The amendment for each project does not reflect a change in the design concept and scope of the project or the conformity analysis years as assumed for the regional emissions analysis of the currently conforming RTP and FTIP. The previous emissions analysis is consistent with the requirements of 40 CFR 93.118 and 93.119, as applicable. This amendment meets all applicable transportation planning requirements per 23 CFR Part 450 (financial constraint, public involvement and consistency with the RTP). Allocating funds to these projects will not delay the implementation of projects in the 2016 RTP/SCS which are necessary to achieve the highway and transportation system envisioned by the plan. BCAG does not have any Transportation Control Measures in the State Implementation Plan (SIP) and therefore the project does not interfere with any TCMs.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: If no significant comments are received, staff is recommending the Board of Directors approve Amendment #7 vote.

APPROVAL OF REVISED 2019 DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE) PROGRAM

PREPARED BY: Cheryl Massae, Human Resources Manager, Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Liaison Officer (DBELO)

ISSUE: Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) and Butte Regional Transit (BRT) have an established Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program. This is mainly a housekeeping item to update the DBE Program to include current procedures and processes staff follows in order to administer the DBE Program.

DISCUSSSION: BCAG receives federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation (FTA) and, as a condition of receiving this assistance, BCAG has signed an assurance that it will fully comply with Title 49 CFR, Part 26. These regulatory provisions and BCAG's DBE Program apply to all of BCAG's FTA-assisted contracts.

It is the policy of BCAG and BRT as defined in Part 26:

- 1. To ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts:
- To create a level playing field on which DBEs can compete fairly for DOTassisted contracts;
- 3. To ensure that the DBE Program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law;
- 4. To ensure that only firms meeting the eligibility standards set forth in 49 CFR Part 26 are permitted to participate as DBEs;
- 5. To help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in DOT-assisted contracts;
- 6. To assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the marketplace outside of the DBE Program.

The 2019 DBE Program is available on BCAG's website at: http://www.bcag.org/documents/DBE/2019%20BCAG%20DBE%20Program.pdf

In Section 26.5 of the Regulations, a DBE is a for-profit, small business that is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned by one or more individuals who are both socially and economically disadvantaged, or, in the case of a corporation, in which fifty-one percent (51%) of the stock is owned by one or more socially and economically disadvantaged individuals; and 2) whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more of the socially and economically disadvantaged individuals who own it.

There is a rebuttable presumption that an individual is both socially and economically disadvantaged if she/he is a citizen or lawfully admitted permanent resident of the United States and is:

- "Black Americans" (including persons having origins in any of the Black racial groups of Africa);
- "Hispanic Americans" (including persons of Central or South American, Cuban, Dominican, Mexican, Puerto Rican, or other Spanish or Portuguese culture or origin, regardless of race);
- "Native Americans" (including persons who are enrolled members of a federally or State recognized Indian tribe, Alaska Natives, or Native Hawaiians);
- "Asian-Pacific Americans" (including persons whose origins are from Brunei, Burma (Myanmar), Cambodia (Kampuchea), China, the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, Fiji, Guam, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Tuvalu, Kirbati, Korea, Laos, Macao, Malaysia, Nauru, the Philippines, Samoa, Taiwan, Thailand, Tonga, the U.S. Trust Territories of the Pacific Islands (Republic of Palau), or Vietnam;
- "Subcontinent Asian Americans" (including persons whose origins are from Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, the Maldives Islands, Nepal, Pakistan, or Sri Lanka);
- Women;
- or a member of any additional group that is designated as socially and economically disadvantaged by the Small Business Administration.

Staff monitors their DOT-assisted contracts for DBE participation, payments made to DBEs and the percentage of total dollars paid to DBEs. This is reported to FTA semi-annually. Currently, BCAG's Overall Goal for DBE participation is 1.28% and is evaluated annually based on type of work to be performed and available contractors within the area.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff has updated the DBE Program in accordance with Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 26 and is recommending the BCAG Board of Directors approve the updated BCAG DBE Program to be in compliance with the federal regulations.

ACCEPTANCE OF MAP-21 PERFORMANCE MEASURE - 2020 SAFETY (PM1)

PREPARED BY: Brian Lasagna, Regional Analyst

ISSUE: As the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Butte County region, BCAG is required to establish targets, track, and report the area's performance measures mandated under the federal Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21), in coordination with Caltrans and the local jurisdictions.

DISCUSSION: Federal transportation legislation (MAP-21) placed new and stronger emphasis on measuring and monitoring the performance of the transportation system and requires states and MPOs to implement a performance-based approach to planning and programming. Performance-based planning and programming includes using transportation performance measures, setting targets, reporting performance, and programming transportation investments directed toward the achievement of transportation system performance outcomes. The performance targets ensure states and MPOs invest resources in transportation projects that achieve national goals in safety, infrastructure condition, congestion, reliability, freight movement, environmental sustainability, and reduced project delivery delays.

On August 31, 2019, Caltrans established statewide safety performance targets for calendar year 2020 – see Table 1. MPOs have 6 months (February 27, 2020) following the states target setting date to: A) establish their own targets; or B) agree to plan and program projects so that they contribute toward the accomplishment of the state target. Performance and targets are to be reported and revised annually.

Note: Targets are based on a 5-year rolling average for all roadways.

Caltrans and the Office of Traffic and Safety (OTS) have adopted "aspirational" statewide targets consistent with the California Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP) and the state goal of reaching zero fatalities by the year 2050.

Included as Attachment #1 is a compilation of the Butte County datasets provided for each safety measure. Trends have been presented based on the rolling 5-year average for all years included in the dataset.

BCAG staff reviewed the data and targets with the BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) at the December 2019 meeting. As with the last two target setting cycles, staff is recommending that BCAG agree to plan and program projects so that they contribute toward the accomplishment of the state target for the 2020 performance year. This recommendation is supported by the TAC.

Included as Attachment #2 is a listing of those projects contained in BCAG's recently adopted 2019 Federal Transportation Improvement Plan (FTIP) that work toward the state safety targets.

Safety performance and targets will be reviewed with the TAC and BCAG Board annually and reported to Caltrans.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: BCAG staff is recommending the BCAG Board of Director's accept the state performance safety targets and the region agree to plan and program projects so they contribute toward the accomplishment of the state safety targets for the 2020 performance year.








BCAG Regional Safety Performance Measure Trends

APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2019/2020-10 FOR ADVANCE ALLOCATION OF REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PLANNING GRANT PLANNING FUNDS

ISSUE: Councils of Governments such as BCAG are eligible to apply for an advance allocation of up to 25% of Regional Early Action Planning grant program funds; a resolution approved by the BCAG Board of Directors is required to receive this allocation of funding.

DISCUSSION: BCAG staff is recommending the BCAG Board of Directors approve resolution 2019/2020-10, which must be submitted with the application package to receive the advance allocation of funding.

Recent approvals of Senate Bill (SB) 113 and Assembly Bill (AB) 101 have resulted in funding available to Councils of Government such as BCAG through a new grant program called Regional Early Action Planning grant program. This program is being administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), and its primary goal is to accelerate housing production in California by cities and counties (local agencies) and facilitate compliance with the Regional Housing Needs Assessment administered by HCD and BCAG.

The Regional Early Action Planning grant program provides one-time allocations of funding to Councils of Governments (COGs) and Multiagency Working Groups in the total amount of \$125 million. These funds are allocated according to a population-based formula; BCAG's total allocation will be \$1,067,175. These funds are intended to be used to achieve the grant program objectives which include:

- Increasing planning efforts related to housing.
- Facilitating local housing production through technical assistance and preparation and adoption of planning documents.
- Identifying current best practices at the regional and statewide level that promote sufficient supply of housing affordable to all income levels, and a strategy for increasing adoption of these practices at the regional level, where viable.

- Developing an education and outreach strategy to inform local agencies of the need and benefits of taking early action related to the sixth cycle regional housing need allocation.
- Facilitating compliance by the local agencies with the next update (6th cycle) of the Regional Housing Needs Assessment to accelerate housing production through process improvements.

The application requirements for the full funding allocation amount (\$1,067,175) will not be released by HCD until early 2020. However, SB 113 allows BCAG to request up to 25 percent of the funding available to it (\$266,793) through an advance allocation to begin work developing work plans, coordinating with local agencies, and developing the full grant application package.

BCAG staff intends to begin utilizing the funds to develop a new work element for the BCAG Overall Work Program, coordinate with the local agencies to determine how best to utilize the funding to achieve the grant program objectives, and begin work on the full grant application package.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the BCAG Board approve resolution 2019/2020-10.

RESOLUTION OF THE BUTTE COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO ENTER INTO, EXECUTE AND DELIVER A STATE OF CALIFORNIA STANDARD AGREEMENT TO SECURE THE REGIONAL EARLY ACTION PLANNING GRANT ADVANCE ALLOCATION

The Board of Directors of the Butte County Association of Governments ("BCAG" or "Applicant") hereby consents to, adopts and ratifies the following resolution:

- A. WHEREAS, the State of California (the "State"), Department of Housing and Community Development ("Department") is authorized to provide up to \$125,000,000 to Councils of Governments and Fiscal Agents of Multiagency Working Groups ("Applicant") under the Regional Early Action Planning grant program (REAP), the regional component of the Local Government Planning Support Grants Program (as described in Health and Safety Code section 50515.02).
- B. **WHEREAS** the Department issued a Notice and Request for Advance Allocation in October 2019 for Regional Early Action Planning grants available to Councils of Government and Fiscal Agents of Multiagency Working Groups;
- C. ISSUE: BCAG is required to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) by December 20, 2019 for the 2020 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

DISCUSSION: The purpose of the RTIP is to identify programming recommendations for the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP is adopted by the California Transportation Commission (CTC).

The STIP is comprised of two components including the Regional Improvement Program and Interregional Improvement Program:

STIP:

- 1) 75% <u>Regional Improvement Program (RIP)</u>. Projects nominated by the Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) like BCAG as part of the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP Document)
- 2) 25% <u>Interregional Improvement Program (IIP)</u>. Projects nominated by Caltrans as part of their Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP).

In developing the RTIPs and ITIP, Caltrans prepares a "Fund Estimate" (FE) which identifies the amount of funding or programming capacity for new projects. The FE is identified for each county in California and is referred to as the "County Shares". Below is a summary of the County Shares for Butte County:

State Route 70 Corridor

The State Route 70 Corridor Project (Segments 1, 2 & 3) represent the segments which are left to be widened to 4 lanes in Butte County. These segments were fully funded and programmed in the 2018 STIP Cycle. The projects on the State Route 70 Corridor currently not fully funded are Segments 4 & 5 in Yuba County from Laurellen Rd just north of Marysville to the Yuba/Butte County line. These segments are only programmed to add a center turn lane and 8-foot shoulders. The additional 2 lanes to provide for a continuous four lane highway is not funded. The funding shortfall to complete the widening requires \$32 million.

During the past two years, BCAG and Caltrans held meetings with representatives from Yuba County and SACOG requesting their support and funding to finish these last segments in Yuba County.

Since the August 22, 2019 BCAG Board meeting, the Yuba County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution to recommend that the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) support the programming of \$4 million in regional funds for the SR 70 Corridor. The City of Marysville also supported a resolution of support (no funding) because the project lies in Yuba County.

In addition, Caltrans released the draft Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP) in where they specifically define the estimated revenues and projects for programming consideration. Due to a lack of funding capacity, the State Route 70 Corridor **was not included**. The primary reasons provided included cost increases for existing projects in the 2018 STIP and lower than anticipated revenues. The STIP will remain in draft form until it is adopted by the CTC at their March 25-26, 2020 Commission meetings.

The combination of the above factors has limited BCAG's ability to solidify a financial plan to complete the corridor. In the meantime, staff is continuing to work with Caltrans, Yuba County, SACOG and the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) in advocating for the completion of the corridor.

Based on the factors identified, Table 1 summarizes the 2020 RTIP Recommendations for Butte County:





Project includes widening to four lanes with a continuous center left-turn lane (5 total lanes) and is scheduled to begin construction in spring 2021.

<u>Funding</u> = \$65,900,000 - \$44.1 million (SHOPP), \$10.9 million (IIP funds), \$10.9 million (RIP funds).

4) State Route 70 Passing Lane Segments 4 & 5 in Yuba County (Yuba/Butte County Line to Laurellen Road)

BCAG programmed \$4 million in RIP funds to Segments 4 & 5 in Yuba County for preparation of environmental documents for widening to four-lanes. Caltrans has a \$102.8 million SHOPP project programmed for Segments 4 & 5 that includes widening to two-lanes with a continuous center left-turn lane (3 total lanes). Funding to construct widening to the ultimate 5 lane facility for Segments 4 & 5 is not programmed, \$32 million is needed to complete this widening. Development of the environmental documents is scheduled to begin in 2020.

<u>Funding</u> = \$106,800,000 - \$102.8 million (SHOPP), \$4 million (RIP funds).

UPDATE ON THE BUTTE REGIONAL CONSERVATION PLAN

PREPARED BY: Chris Devine, Planning Manager

ISSUE: The final BRCP and EIS/EIR were submitted to the state and federal wildlife agencies for final approvals on June 28, 2019. Since then, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) regional office in Sacramento has indicated it will not forward the final documents to the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) due to a new federal protocol requiring congressional support.

DISCUSSION: At the September BCAG Board of Directors meeting, the Board approved a letter addressed to USFWS regional office director Paul Souza that outlined a number of concerns and requested that USFWS regional office forward the final BRCP and EIS/EIR to the U.S. Department of the Interior in Washington D.C. for final review and federal register notification.

To date, the USFWS Regional Office has not changed course, and has not moved the documents to the DOI. BCAG staff has also not received any letter or correspondence from USFWS regional office in response to the letter from the Board. USFWS field office staff did confirm however that we no longer need to comply with the October 30th deadline for filing the Record of Decision for the EIS/EIR.

BCAG staff will continue working with its environmental legal counsel and main consultant team at ICF to seek resolution of this issue. Staff will provide an update to the Board at next month's meeting on any additional progress made.

BUTTE REGIONAL TRANSIT (B-LINE) QUARTERLY PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1ST QUARTER 2019/29 FY

ISSUE: Staff is presenting key financial and statistical results for Butte Regional Transit for the first quarter of fiscal year 2019/20.

DISCUSSION: The attached tables present a summary of key financial and operation results for Butte Regional Transit. Financial data presentation compares first quarter results to the annual budget and to the prior year quarter. Operations tables represent a performance-based assessment in comparison to the same quarter of the prior fiscal year. The measures of revenue, expense, ridership, vehicle revenue hours and passengers per vehicle revenue hour are broken down by the four types of service — fixed route and paratransit; urban and rural. This separation helps to define where improvements and/or issues are taking place. Accidents and complaints, gauging safety and customer satisfaction, are analyzed for the system as a whole.

In comparing operations to the prior year, the greatest factor will be the effects of the Camp Fire, as the first quarter of 2018/19 was the last unaffected quarter. As a result of population changes, there is an expected shift of passengers and dollars to the urban systems from the rural systems. A 12% reduction of overall budgeted service hours in the transit system has increased the annual operator contract *rate* by 12%, as the same total costs are spread over fewer service hours.

The first quarter is also a slower time of the year, with schools closed for the first half of the quarter. Additionally, the fare increase did not go into effect until September 1, 2019, and thus most of the quarter's revenues do not reflect an increase in fares. These factors play a significant part in the reduced fare revenues, which have caused some farebox ratios to not meet required annual targets. This is expected to improve in the following quarters.

Rural Fixed Route is exceeding the TDA (Transportation Development Act) farebox ratio requirement of 10% ticket sales to operating expenditures. It is currently operating at a ratio of just above 15%. Ridership for the quarter was down 23% from prior year quarter due to the large reduction in Routes 40 and 41 to Paradise. Expenditures for services and supplies were 24% of the annual budget for the year. Farebox revenues are 22% of budget.

Urban Fixed Route is not meeting the TDA farebox ratio requirement of 20%. The ratio of 17.89% is low due to relatively low fares in the quarter, with only 21% of revenues received, and 24% of budgeted expenditures as of September. An increase of 14% in ridership over the prior year quarter was not enough to impact the farebox revenues, which increased only 11% compared to prior year quarter. As explained above this is not a surprising result, due to the timing of the fare increase and slower first quarter expectations. Expenditures have increased 16% over prior year but are in line with budget expectations at 24% of the annual budget. While this increase in expense may seem alarming, it is a result of shifting service cost from rural to urban systems in the new Transdev contract. Total costs included in the contract are spread over 12% less service hours due to the Camp Fire, which increased the rate 12%. The urban system bears the greatest brunt of this shift in costs because urban route service hours did not decline. Additional increases in the quarter relate to maintenance costs associated with several busses and the timing of annual payments.

Rural Paratransit is not meeting the TDA farebox ratio requirement of 10%, currently at 9.0% for the year. Ridership has fallen nearly 60% after the Camp Fire. Passenger fares are falling short of budget projections. The fare increase in September of 2019 will be needed to meet annual farebox requirements. Expenditures are in line with budget expectations at 24% of the annual budget. The efficiency of this system remains strong at 3.3 passengers per hour.

Urban Paratransit is slightly lower than the TDA farebox ratio requirement of 10%, currently at 9.86%. Ridership is up 14% from the prior year quarter due to displaced riders from Paradise. The passengers per hour remains consistent with the last quarter of the prior fiscal year at 3.5. Farebox revenues are on pace at 26% of budget. Expenditures are slightly higher than budget expectations at 28% of the annual budget largely due to increased service hours.

Overall – There were 8 accidents in the quarter, which is higher than desired. The number of accidents for the quarter was at a ratio of 45,558 miles per accident, below our established standard of one accident for every 80,000 miles. However, when factored over the entire previous 12 months the ratio is 80,685 miles, which averages out to meet expectations. There were 6 complaints in the quarter which is within reason per the number of passengers served.
