ACCEPTANCE OF BCAG FISCAL AUDITS AND TDA AUDITS FOR CITIES, TOWN AND COUNTY FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2018

PREPARED BY: Julie Quinn, Chief Fiscal Officer

ISSUE: BCAG is required to prepare a fiscal audit annually. In addition, BCAG prepares the fiscal and compliance audits for the Transportation Development Act (TDA) claimants for both Local Transportation Funds (LTF) and State Transit Assistance (STA) funds. BCAG's fiscal audit and the TDA audits have been completed and are being presented to the BCAG Board for acceptance.

DISCUSSION: <u>BCAG Audit:</u> In accordance with State and Federal regulations, BCAG's basic financial statements and supplemental information have been audited by independent auditors, Richardson & Associates, certified public accountants. Included in the agenda packet is a copy of the BCAG audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. The Independent Auditor's Report is located on page 1 shows an unmodified (clean) opinion. A review of the fiscal year is presented in the Management's Discussion and Analysis, located on pages 3-12. The Independent Auditors' Report on Compliance, beginning on page 53, indicates that there were no financial statement findings, State compliance findings or major federal award program findings in the BCAG audit. Ingrid Sheipline, of Richardson & Associates, will be on hand to review the audit and answer any questions. Also included are the Independent Auditors' Management Letter and a Required Statement of Accounting Standards letter.

<u>TDA Audits:</u> BCAG annually budgets for the preparation of the required TDA audits for each of the claimants. The audit covers receipt and use of TDA funds for each of the cities, town and county, as well as the City of Gridley Senior Taxi Fund. Each board member should have a copy of their jurisdiction's TDA audit included in the agenda packet. There were no current findings associated with the TDA audits; however the auditors did make some suggestions in the Independent Auditors' Management Letter regarding improvements to the process. Staff is in agreement with the comments and is developing a plan to incorporate the suggestions.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: The Chief Fiscal Officer requests the BCAG Board of Directors accept the BCAG annual fiscal audit and the TDA audits prepared for the claimants for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018.

AUTHORIZATION FOR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO SIGN COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT WITH CALTRANS DISTRICT 3 TO IMPLEMENT STATE ROUTE 191 MITIGATION REQUIREMENTS

PREPARED BY: Andy Newsum, Deputy Director

ISSUE: On behalf of Caltrans District 3, BCAG is implementing mitigation requirements for the State Route 191 safety project completed in 2017.

DISCUSSION: Late in 2016, BCAG was approached by Caltrans to assist in implementing identified environmental mitigation requirements for the project on an approximate two (2) mile section of State Route 191 between Butte College and the Town of Paradise (PM 6.8 to 8.6).

Mitigations required are the perpetual preservation of 181.5 acres of blue oak woodland habitat. District 3 Caltrans Environmental and BCAG staff entered into a dialog to determine the funding and details supporting a Cooperative Agreement for BCAG to accomplish the work on behalf of Caltrans District 3. In mid-February, terms stated in the Cooperative Agreement have been finalized. On behalf of Caltrans District 3, BCAG staff will locate and purchase, by conservation easement or fee title, the necessary acreage of blue oak woodland to accomplish the mitigation.

In addition to the execution of Cooperative Agreement, BCAG will locate suitable oak woodland habitat and develop the following documents to implement and complete the mitigation requirements:

- Land Management Plan
- Agreement Declaring Restrictive Covenants
- Conservation Easement
- Endowment Agreement

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Authorize the Executive Director to sign the Cooperative Agreement with Caltrans District 3 to accomplish SR 191 Mitigation Requirements.

2020 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN (RTP) & SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES STRATEGY (SCS) DEVELOPMENT SCHEDULE

PREPARED BY: Ivan Garcia, Transportation Programming Specialist

ISSUE: BCAG is responsible for state and federally required transportation plans and programs in the region including the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)/Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS).

DISCUSSION: The RTP/SCS is adopted every 4 years to identify the region's long-range transportation plan for a 20-year minimum horizon. The 2020 RTP/SCS will cover the years from 2020 to 2040. The current RTP/SCS was adopted in December 2016. As such, the update is scheduled to be adopted by December 2020. The process to update the Plan began at the start of the 2018/19 fiscal year and will be continue through 2020.

The RTP/SCS serves as the foundation for the development of the short-range Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) and the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). The RTP/SCS can be amended at any time by the BCAG Board of Directors. As information is developed it will be posted online at the BCAG website.

The 2020 RTP/SCS will contain the following:

- 1. RTP/SCS Document including all required elements (Policy, Action, Financial and the SCS)
- Air Quality Conformity Analysis and Determination demonstrating that the projects in the RTP/SCS conform to the applicable federal air quality requirements.
- 3. Environmental Impact Report complying with the California Environmental Quality Act requirements

The following activities related to the development of the 2020 RTP/SCS have been provided for the Board's information and discussion.

Camp Fire

Prior to the Camp Fire, BCAG staff had been coordinating with the local jurisdictions in preparing the long-term regional growth forecasts of population, housing, and

employment, a key piece of the RTP/SCS which informs the forecasted development pattern included in the plan. Following the Camp Fire, BCAG staff have been meeting with state and federal agencies and local jurisdiction partners to determine the best course of action for the 2020 RTP/SCS considering the significant impacts to population, housing, employment, and the transportation system. At this point, meeting the original target completion date of December 2020 appears to be the best path considering the cyclical nature of the plan (every 4 years) and the relation to other programs and projects which rely on the plan (i.e., Regional Housing Needs Plan, FTIP, Air Quality, and local land use, housing, and transportation plans and projects). Therefore, BCAG will resume development of the plan and work to utilize the "best available" data in preparing the regional growth forecasts and forecasted development pattern, as required by statute.

<u>Schedule</u>

Included as an attachment for the Board's review and comment is the latest revised schedule for the 2020 RTP/SCS. As scheduled, BCAG staff is working to prepare the Policy, Action and Financial Elements over the next few months.

The Policy Element will include the goals, objectives and policies for the RTP/SCS. This chapter will be reviewed to ensure any changes in guidance are incorporated, such as prioritizing performance measures.

The Action Element includes each mode of transportation and will identify specific projects which can be reasonably anticipated to be completed within the timeframe of the plan.

The Financial Element will identify financial projections for each fund source that is typically programmed in the FTIP and or RTIP.

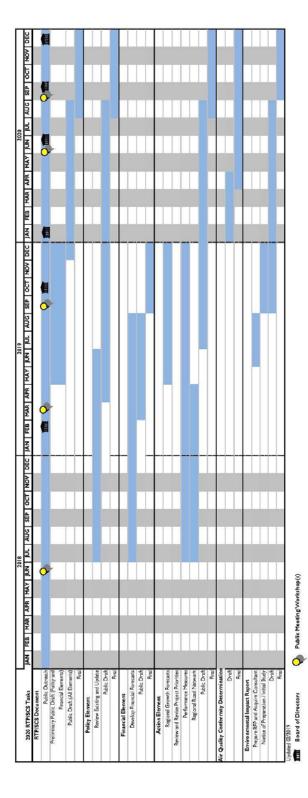

2019 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN UPDATE

ISSUE: BCAG is required to update its Public Participation Plan (PPP) reflecting changes to the Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainability Communities (RTP/SCS) guidance.

DISCUSSION: Minor updates to the PPP are needed to reflect updated guidelines for the development of the 2020 RTP/SCS. Staff will update the PPP to address Environmental Justice and Federal Title VI requirements as required. Staff is currently updating the language and will present it to the BCAG Transportation Advisory Committee for review and comment as well as hold an open house public workshop for public input.

An open house public workshop will be scheduled in early March. The workshop will be noticed in the local newspaper, posted online at BCAG's website and posted on the B-Line system.

Staff will present the updated PPP at the March 2019 Board meeting for approval. Once adopted, the BCAG Board may amend the PPP at any time. BCAG's review of the PPP for any needed updates will coincide with the development of the RTP/SCS.

POST CAMP FIRE REGIONAL POPULATION & TRANSPORTATION STUDY

PREPARED BY: Brian Lasagna, Regional Analyst

ISSUE: The Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) is the state designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) and federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Butte County region. As such, BCAG is responsible for developing long-term regional growth forecasts and maintaining a regional travel demand model (TDM) to assist in the preparation and analysis of regional transportation, housing, land use and air quality plans and the associated environmental documents. The forecasts and TDM are also utilized by local agencies in preparing and analyzing transportation and land use plans and projects. Following the Camp Fire, the estimates of current population, housing, land use, and travel are unknown. In addition, the existing long-term forecasts of these planning elements are likely no longer applicable to the region.

DISCUSSION: On November 8, 2018, the Camp Fire burned through the incorporated Town of Paradise (*population 26,572*) and the unincorporated communities of Magalia, Concow, Butte Creek Canyon and Pulga in Butte County. The Camp Fire is the largest and most devastating fire in California's history and the most destructive in the nation in the past 100 years.

The aftermath of the Camp Fire has left an estimated 30,000 residents displaced with many of them now living in temporary or unconventional housing in the various communities of Butte County including incorporated areas of Chico, Oroville, Gridley and Biggs. An unknown number of residents are also estimated to have permanently or temporally relocated to the neighboring counties of Tehama, Glenn, Colusa, Sutter and Yuba or other areas in and out of state.

The overnight redistribution of population has resulted in an immediate and significant impact to local traffic circulation and infrastructure, medical institutions, schools and housing availability in these neighboring cities. There has also been an unanticipated demand for additional services, including increased transit operations to evacuation shelters and temporary housing areas established throughout the county, and to social service agencies providing support to evacuees located within these areas.

In December of 2018, BCAG began coordinating meetings with city and county planning and public works departments to identify immediate needs and get a general understanding of the changing transportation and housing patterns and how to collect

useful data to address these needs, establish current estimates, and develop future forecasts of *transportation*, *housing*, *and employment*.

Based on these immediate needs, BCAG developed a proposal to prepare a regional transportation and population study which will look at regional population, housing, employment, and traffic data for pre (2018) and post (2020) Camp Fire time periods. In addition, the study will develop several scenarios for the 2030 time period based on existing research, empirical data, and existing policies available at the time of study development. The purpose of the study will be to inform the 2024 RTP/SCS and various land use, transportation, and housing plans and projects beyond the "best available" data used in development of the 2020 RTP/SCS.

BCAG recently received notification from Caltrans that the proposal was approved. Work on the project is expected to commence in July 2019 with the acquisition of a knowledgeable and experienced consultant team. It is anticipated the project will be completed prior to July 2021.

BCAG staff will continue to inform the BCAG Board regarding the development of study.

2019 CALIFORNIA TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION (CTC) TOWN HALL MEETING HOSTED BY BCAG FOR THE NORTH STATE SUPER REGION

ISSUE: BCAG has been selected by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to host the spring 2019 Town Hall meeting in Chico at the BCAG Board Room.

DISCUSSION: The purpose of the Town Hall is to showcase the region in a less formal environment and highlight projects or concerns the region is facing. Two years ago, BCAG hosted a Town Hall in Chico for Butte County only. The "North State Super Region" (NSSR) is composed of California's northern 16 counties from Butte County to the Oregon border.

The CTC is responsible for programming and allocating funds for the construction of highway, passenger rail, transit and active transportation improvements throughout California. The Commission also advises and assists the Secretary of the California State Transportation Agency and the Legislature in formulating and evaluating state policies and plans for California's transportation programs. The Commission is also an active participant in the initiation and development of State and Federal legislation that seeks to secure financial stability for the State's transportation needs.

Regular CTC meetings are held in large cities whereas Town Hall meetings are held in smaller communities. Two Town Hall meetings are held each year, typically one in northern California and one in southern California. Due to the remoteness of the smaller counties, CTC staff reached out to BCAG to host a NSSR to highlight northern California. The CTC - NSSR Town Hall is scheduled for:

BUTTE REGIONAL TRANSIT- BLINE 2018/19 2nd QUARTER REPORT

PREPARED BY: Jim Peplow, Senior Planner

ISSUE: Butte Regional Transit provides quarterly reports for fiscal year 2018/19.

DISCUSSION: The attached tables present a summary of key financial and operational results for Butte Regional Transit. Financial data presentation compares results to annual budget and prior year to date. Operations tables represent a performance-based assessment in comparison to the same quarter of the prior fiscal year. The measures of revenue, expense, ridership, vehicle revenue hours and passengers per vehicle revenue hour are broken down by the four types of service – fixed route and paratransit; urban and rural. This separation helps to define where improvements and/or issues are taking place. Accidents and complaints, gauging safety and customer satisfaction, are analyzed for the system as a whole.

As expected, in the aftermath of the Camp Fire, the 2nd quarter numbers have been significantly impacted, especially in the rural services. Since November 8, three routes have been suspended or modified - Routes 31 (Paradise-Oroville), 40 (Paradise-Chico) and 41 (Magalia-Chico). Route 31 has still not resumed operation. Route 41 began a modified schedule on December 3 in conjunction with residents being allowed to return to the Magalia area. Once the evacuation orders were lifted for Paradise, Route 40 began running a modified schedule on December 24th. These modified schedules for both routes 40 and 41 are still currently in place.

Additional items effecting the fixed routes during the quarter are the school closures which impacted ridership and free fare days from November 14th through the 30th which provided 38,506 rides.

After the Camp Fire, the Paratransit service on the Ridge was suspended and one additional vehicle was placed into service in the Chico area to handle the impact of relocated passengers. When fixed route service was resumed on the Ridge a Paratransit vehicle was made available for on-demand service.

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Rural Fixed Route is exceeding the TDA (Transportation Development Act) farebox ratio requirement of 10% ticket sales to operating expenditures. It is currently operating at a ratio of 20%. As expected, ridership for the quarter was down 22% from prior year quarter. With of modification of routes, revenue hours are down 13.2% for the quarter. Expenditures for services and supplies were 44% of the annual budget for the year. Interestingly, the farebox revenues are 50% of budget. This could be due to pre-sold passes.

Urban Fixed Route is meeting the TDA farebox ratio requirement of 20%, at 20.8%. The ridership saw a decrease of 7% over the prior year quarter. Farebox is 48% of the projected budget. Service hours are in line with budget expectations, while expenditures are at 46% of the annual budget.

Rural Paratransit is slightly higher than the TDA farebox ratio requirement of 10%, currently at 11.1% for the year. The ridership and service hours are both down 34% from the prior year's quarter. Passenger Fares are 42% of budget expectations. With the suspension of service on the Ridge expenditures are 39% of budget.

Urban Paratransit is meeting the TDA farebox ratio requirement at 10.5%. Ridership is down 7% from the prior year quarter. Because of the added vehicle from Paradise service hours saw a 5.7% increase for the quarter. Farebox revenues are on pace at 52% of budget. Expenditures are in line with budget expectations at 50% of the annual budget.

Overall - The number of accidents for the quarter was at a ratio of 122,142 miles per accident, well above our established standard of one accident per every 80,000 miles. The number of complaints during this past quarter is well within our expected ratio.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS (RFP) FOR BUTTE REGIONAL TRANSIT OPERATIONS CONTRACT UPDATE

ISSUE: A solicitation through a Request for Proposals (RFP) has been made available to all service providers interested in providing the BLine administration, operations and maintenance services for the contract cycle beginning in July 2019.

DISCUSSION: In accordance with Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and State Transit Assistance (STA) funding obtained for operating the services contract, BCAG/BLine staff released an RFP on December 3rd, 2019 soliciting interest from all service providers capable of delivering the identified Scope of Work. The RFP has been made available on the BCAG website and Transit Talent Publication and website assuring maximum exposure to transit providers. On Tuesday January 15, 2019 a mandatory pre-proposal meeting was held at the BCAG offices with the 5 following service providers attending:

- Transdev
- Total Transit
- Storer Transit
- First Transit
- National Express

Several questions were received and answered prior to and following the mandatory pre-proposal meeting.

One (1) proposal was received in the BCAG offices on February 12th, 2019 from Transdev. BCAG/BLine Administrative Selection Committee/Evaluation Team is completing reviews of the proposal. Contract negotiations will begin in March with an expected contract award in May of 2019.

UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS PUBLIC WORKSHOP SCHEDULE

PREPARED BY: Jim Peplow, Senior Planner

ISSUE: As the administrator of Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds for Butte County, BCAG is responsible for performing the annual Unmet Transit Needs (UTN) process. This process requires at least one public hearing for the purpose of soliciting comments on unmet transit needs that may exist within the county.

DISCUSSION: In Butte County the UTN process entails a comprehensive public outreach program and series of open house style meetings throughout the county, in addition to the public hearing before the BCAG Board of Directors. At each of the meetings, testimony is solicited regarding perceived unmet transit needs that may be reasonable to meet. The purpose of this process is to ensure that all unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet are met before funds are expended for non-transit uses, such as streets and roads.

Once the testimony is obtained, it is analyzed to determine if there are any transit needs that meet the adopted definitions of "Unmet Transit Need" and "Reasonable to Meet". This analysis report, called the Transit Needs Assessment, is reviewed by the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), which provides a recommendation for Unmet Transit Needs Findings to the BCAG Board of Directors. If the Board determines there are unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet, the affected jurisdiction must satisfy those needs before any TDA funds may be expended for non-transit purposes.

This year's meetings will be held during the month of March, with comments being accepted through March 28. The public hearing will be held March 28, 2019 before the BCAG Board of Directors at its normally scheduled time. Please see Attachment 1 for the complete schedule, which has been published in the local newspapers, posted on B-Line's website and Facebook page, and posted in each of the B-Line buses.
